"To Serve our Public with Integrity and Empathy"

To Our Community:

The Wentzville Police Department continues to emphasize community engagement. We are currently at the end of developing a survey program that will allow citizens who come into contact with Wentzville Police Department staff to provide feedback on their experience. We will use this information to tweak the manner in which we provide services to our community.

We continue our community outreach programs such as Citizen Police Academy, Teen Police Academy, Welcome to Wentzville program and National Night Out. We have other programs such as Cops and Bobbers, Coffee with a Cop and Trunk or Treat events. We are constantly scanning, looking for opportunities to engage with our community in our efforts to "humanize the badge."

One of our programs, the Business Residential Liaison Officer program, has met with great success. This officer has the responsibility of interacting with members of our business district and offers suggestions to reduce problems like shoplifting, employee theft, and other related issues. He is our in-house referee who intercedes in long-term neighborhood disputes, often bringing people together to find peaceful solutions for these types of problems.

The Wentzville Police Department recognizes the importance of regional partnerships. While we still participate in joint agency programs to provide more effective and diverse services to this City such as the St. Charles County Regional Drug Task Force and St. Charles County Regional S.W.A.T, we have recently participated in the development of the St. Charles County Regional Critical Incident Response Team which is a regional approach to critical incidents such as officer involved shootings. Having a regional team look at a situation such as that provides for transparency and accountability and instills public confidence in our police department. Additionally, the Wentzville Police Department has recently become involved in the St. Charles County Regional Crime Interdiction Task Force. This is a regional proactive effort where each agency in the County assigns officers to a team that is charged with looking for and addressing criminal activity. This team has been very successful in addressing these types of issues.

The Wentzville Police Department supports and participates in the St. Louis County Major Case Squad. This unit provides a means to assist ourselves and our neighboring communities in solving acts of heinous or high-profile crimes occurring in that community. We provide investigators and report writers for the Squad. For the first time ever, we had one of our Sergeants command a Major Case Squad investigation. This investigation came to a successful conclusion where a suspect was taken into custody and significant evidence was recovered pointing to that person's guilt.

In 2018, the city joined the St. Charles County Regional Emergency Management Operations Center, wherein agencies within the county share resources for planning, preparing and responding to catastrophic events, incidents and emergencies. The Wentzville Police Department has one Emergency Management Officer assigned to the Regional Emergency Operations Center.

In 2019, the Wentzville Police Department earned accreditation through the Missouri Police Chiefs Association and we submitted our files for recertification in 2021. The accreditation process is a rigorous process that ensures the department has established policies that are current and follow the best practices of law enforcement nationwide. The department must meet over 400 standards in order to become accredited.

As stated in our department's mission statement, we are "dedicated to delivering Constitutionally sound, superior law enforcement services with professionalism; ensuring citizens peacefully and safely enjoy their lives, building strong partnerships and relationships with residents, visitors, and businesses in the City of Wentzville while demanding the officers who serve and the staff that supports does so with the utmost pride, unmatchable courage and unwavering integrity." The department's adopted slogan summarizes this mission: "*Public Service with Integrity*"

The police department supports a strong sense of community, caring for one another, values and principles of good citizenship, and a quality of service that contributes to the common good. It is the vision of this police department to ensure Wentzville remains a safe city to live, work, play and grow. Cooperation and partnerships between the police, the public, the business and professional communities, and our elected officials are paramount to the success of maintaining social order in a positive manner.


The purpose of this report is to show statistical data of the police department and the crime trends it experiences.

Divisions:

The Wentzville Police Department is comprised of 82 commissioned law enforcement officers along with 20 full-time and several part-time support staff employees. Chief Paul West leads the agency which is comprised of two divisions: Field Operations and Support Services Divisions. He also oversees the Records Division. Major Leon Burton is the Assistant Chief of Police and manages the Captain of Support Services, the Captain of Field Operations, the Professional Standards Unit and the Emergency Management Specialist. Captain Kevin Pyatt commands the Field Operations Division and Captain Emmanuel Borroum commands the Support Services Division.

The Field Operations Division is comprised of all the Patrol Platoons, the Communications Center, the Corrections Division, and the K9 Unit. Patrol Officers are the backbone of the department and serve the community at large by responding to a variety of calls for service while combining a proactive approach to crime prevention by actively patrolling the neighborhoods and business areas.

The Support Services Division consists of all supporting functions of the police department. Encompassed in this Division are the Detective Bureau, School Resource Officers, Traffic Unit, Animal Control Officers, and Park Rangers.

The department embraces new technology and continually looks for improvements that will keep us on the cutting edge of advancement. The department has several small Unmanned Aerial Systems (sUAS) (Drones), body cameras, FARO system, Taser7 (Electronic Control Devices), Evidence.com video storage and in 2021, purchased 15 FLOCK license plate readers and purchased a database called Idicore that the detectives use in their investigations.

Among other responsibilities, the Administrative Section (Chief) is accountable for the formation, creation, submission, implementation, and maintenance of budget expenditures for the Police Department's operation.





National Incident Based Reporting (NIBRS)

The Records Department has been submitting statistical data to the FBI and the State of Missouri through NIBRS since 2017. This change was made due to NIBRS being mandated for all agencies to convert from UCR to NIBRS by the year 2021.

NIBRS allows for an agency to submit up to 10 offenses that occurred with one incident, rather than just the main office that the UCR summary-based program allowed. An example would be if there was an assault and a theft that occurred, with UCR, we would only report the assault; with NIBRS we will report both the assault and the theft.

In NIBRS, there are Group A and Group B offenses. There are 52 Group A offenses that we report. With the Group A offenses, NIBRS counts the offenses, as well as the arrests for those crimes. There are 10 Group B offenses. For these type offenses, NIBRS will only count the arrest.


UCR and NIBRS both have Crimes against Property and Crimes against Persons. However, with NIBRS, they have added a third category of Crimes against Society. Crimes against Society are typically victimless crimes, such as curfew violations, disorderly conduct, runaways, or trespassing.




Law Enforcement Officers Killed or Assaulted (LEOKA):




Traffic Accident Report:


Citations/Warnings Report:

Communications/Records Activity:

The Communications and the Records Divisions handle multiple types of situations. Dispatch communicates with the officers via radio and telephone. They enter calls in the computer system to track who is responding and the information that is relayed. They run subjects through the MULES system for the officers to see vehicle registration, driver's license status, and criminal history. They answer the 911 calls, as well as non-emergency calls.

The Records Division answers incoming calls to the department and routes them to the appropriate division, works with the public and other agencies in obtaining copies of reports and statistics. They enter data into the records management system for NIBRS reporting and quality control of reports. They work with records retention and destruction, as well as review traffic accident reports for electronic submission to the state, among a host of other responsibilities.








Use of Force
