### Be Safe and Seen on Halloween!

The City of Wentzville wishes everyone a very happy Halloween! When your child leaves home to collect goodies on the spookiest night of the year, be sure to make Halloween safety a priority. To ensure your child has a fun-filled evening of trick-or-treating, here are a few tips from the Wentzville Police Department to be "safe and seen" on Halloween.

- Carry glow sticks or flashlights, and use reflective tape or stickers on costumes and bags to help kids be seen by drivers.
- Children under age 12 should be accompanied by an adult at all times.
- Slow down and be alert while driving! Turn on your headlights early in the evening, so you can spot kids from further away.
- Remind kids to cross the street at corners or in crosswalks and to never step in front of oncoming traffic.
- Choose face paint over costume masks; masks can limit a child's vision.

### Fall Tree Limb Collection

Twice each year, the City's Chipper Program provides residents a free, convenient way to dispose of small tree limbs. The fall tree-limb pickup will take place over a three-week period — by ward. 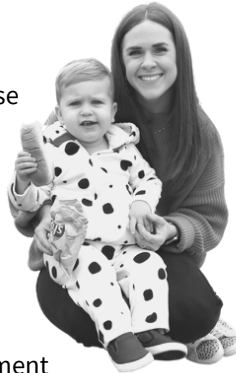
The fall 2022 schedule is as follows:

- Ward 1: Week of Oct. 3
- Ward 2: Week of Oct. 10
- Ward 3: Week of Oct. 17

Please have your tree limbs stacked at the curb by 6 a.m. on Monday of your scheduled week. Tree limb pickup is NOT associated with your trash day or with the City's contracted trash hauler. The City of Wentzville's Street Department coordinates the pickup for the Chipper Program. Tree limbs must be less than eight inches in diameter. Tree limbs should not be bundled or placed in bags. Leaves, root balls, decorative grasses, or grass clippings are not included in this collection. If you have questions, please call the Public Works Department at (636) 327-5101, option 1.

Put on your costumes and head over to the Station 1 Firehouse on Luetkenhaus Boulevard for this two-hour Trunk-or-Treat event on Saturday, Oct. 29 beginning at 11 a.m. This event is sponsored by Wentzville Firefighters Community Outreach and Wentzville Parks and Recreation. All who preregister will receive a pumpkin, a hot dog, a bag of chips and a drink. Attendees will enjoy games, face painting, "trunk-or-treat" and other activities. Each member of the family planning to attend the event should preregister. This event will run as scheduled, rain or shine. In the case of inclement weather, the event will be moved indoors to the firetruck bay. ## WPD Crime Mapping

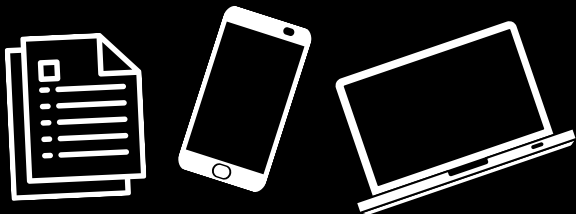
The Wentzville Police Department works hard to keep our community safe. Part of that effort is Crime Mapping. Crime Mapping is the process of logging crimes by location and type to track the frequency of certain crimes in certain areas.

In conjunction with St. Charles County Regional Law Enforcement Agencies, the Wentzville Missouri Police Department actively provides data to the St. Charles County Regional Crime Map. This map allows residents to check for offenses reported within the county and/or participating cities. New data is uploaded weekly. Users can view offenses within the last 14 or 30 days, or year-to-date, and reports can be filtered.
