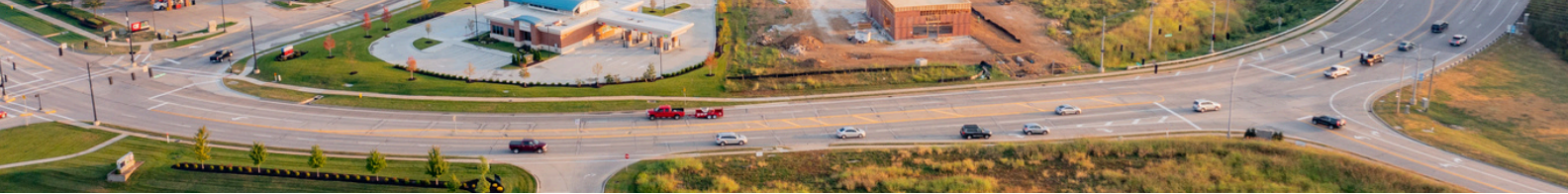
Mission: Clean Stream 2025

Investing in Wentzville's Transportation *Future*

The City of Wentzville remains committed to long-range planning and strategic investment in its transportation infrastructure. Over the last several years, the Board of Aldermen has provided clear direction on key priorities to ensure that Wentzville's roads, sidewalks and public spaces continue to support growth, safety and connectivity. A vital component of this effort is the City's Capital Improvement Plan (CIP), which outlines long-term infrastructure investments designed to enhance mobility, improve safety and accommodate future development. On this page and the next, you'll find an overview of Wentzville's transportation project stages, a breakdown of ongoing and upcoming road maintenance efforts, and highlights of key transportation projects aimed at improving travel for residents, businesses and visitors. These strategic improvements help ensure that Wentzville's infrastructure keeps pace with the City's evolving needs while reinforcing a commitment to sustainable growth and enhanced quality of life.

What Are Capital Improvements?

Capital improvements are physical enhancements to public infrastructure throughout Wentzville. These projects include the construction and improvement of streets, bridges, stormwater systems, parks and other essential public facilities. The Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) outlines the long-term vision for these investments, ensuring that Wentzville's infrastructure keeps pace with the needs of residents, businesses and visitors.

Building a Stronger Wentzville

Through roadway expansions, intersection upgrades, pedestrian-friendly enhancements and revitalization projects, Wentzville is laying the groundwork for a more connected and accessible community. The City's investment in modern infrastructure, collaborative partnerships and proactive maintenance ensures that Wentzville remains a place where residents can travel safely and efficiently. As Wentzville continues to grow, so does the commitment to responsible planning, thoughtful investment and ongoing improvements. Every project — whether large-scale roadway construction or routine maintenance—plays a role in shaping the future of our City.

FROM PLANNING TO PAVEMENT

A well-planned transportation system is essential for a growing community like Wentzville. From roadway expansions to pedestrian-friendly infrastructure, each project follows a structured, multi-phase process to ensure safe and efficient travel for residents and visitors.

This process begins with planning and funding, moves through design and land acquisition, and ultimately reaches construction — where improvements take shape. Each step plays a crucial role in ensuring projects are thoughtfully developed, properly funded and effectively implemented. By investing in its transportation network, Wentzville is paving the way for a more connected and accessible future.

PLANNING

Planning is critical for the success of such a rapidly growing community. Project planning begins with the City's Comprehensive Plan and Thoroughfare Plan that help establish the City's long-term transportation goals. These broad objectives, emerging needs, and funding or development opportunities each play a significant role in how the City's projects are prioritized.

FUNDING

Once a project has been identified as a priority, the City needs to find a way to pay for it. Transportation improvements generally require significant investment, and the City has been fortunate to secure funding assistance from county, state and federal programs. Because some of these funding programs involve specific schedules, funding and project timelines are often intertwined.

DESIGN

The design phase determines how to meet project goals within the established budget and schedule. This complex process involves creating detailed plans and specifications, often taking years to complete. Skilled professionals balance the needs of motorists, pedestrians, utilities and property owners. To ensure quality, the City uses a qualifications-based selection process to hire the most qualified teams.

ACQUISITION

Per the City's Thoroughfare Plan and Municipal Code, much of the land for transportation projects is dedicated as right of way through development. When additional land is needed, the City works with property owners to secure right of way and easements. This complex process can take months or years.

CONSTRUCTION

Construction means progress, but it can also inconvenience motorists and residents. While some disruptions are unavoidable, the City minimizes them through careful planning, detailed design and strong contract management. This phase is when the project visibly takes shape, bringing improved infrastructure and connectivity to life.

Maintaining Wentzville's Roads

Keeping streets in good condition is essential for safe and smooth travel. The City of Wentzville maintains more than 360 lane miles of roads across neighborhoods and commercial areas. Through maintenance efforts like Annual Slab Replacement and pothole repairs, the City works to address deterioration caused by weather and traffic. These ongoing improvements not only extend the lifespan of Wentzville's roads but also enhance driving conditions for everyone.

Street Maintenance: Slab Replacement

In response to resident input, the Board of Aldermen continues to focus its attention on the annual street maintenance program. The City annually reviews pavement conditions and develops a slab-replacement program designed to address deteriorated pavement and to improve the City's streets. Staff uses this information to develop a program that focuses on streets and subdivisions that are in poor condition and that considers safety, coordination needs, prior commitments and opportunities that would make certain repairs a priority. Potholes: Causes, Concerns, and Repairs

Potholes are annoying road hazards that can cause bumpy rides. They form when water seeps into tiny cracks in the road's surface. During colder weather, this water freezes and expands, creating larger gaps. When the ice melts, the weakened pavement collapses under the weight of traffic, forming a hole. The continuous cycle of water infiltration, freezing, melting and traffic pressure worsens the pothole over time. Maintenance crews work to fill potholes to ensure smoother and safer roads for drivers. It is important to make sure pothole concerns are directed where they need to go! Upcoming Projects

David Hoekel Parkway Phase 3

- David Hoekel Parkway (DHP) Phase 3 Project begins at West Meyer Road and extends approximately 3.25 miles north to Peine Road.
- The new roadway will consist of two traffic lanes with a curb and gutter and a multi-use pathway on one side (for pedestrians and bicyclists).

Mexico Road Improvements (Josephville Road to Midland Park Drive)

- This proposed project will resurface the existing Mexico Road between Josephville Road and Brookview Way Drive, widen the shoulders, re-align the intersection at Hancock Road, and build an additional sidewalk from Lakeview Elementary School to Westwind Park Drive.

Route Z Widening (Interstate Drive to Perry Cate Boulevard)

- This project will widen Route Z to a four-lane roadway south of Interstate Drive to Perry Cate Boulevard, with dedicated left-turn and right-turn lanes at key side streets.
- Associated with this widening is also the widening/replacement of the bridge over Peruque Creek to accommodate the four-lane cross-section and the extension of a multi-use trail.

These projects are in various stages of planning and construction, with start dates from 2025 to 2027.

Wentzville Parkway South Phase 2 (I-70 to Interstate Drive)

- The Wentzville Parkway South Phase 2 improvement project will build upon the Wentzville Parkway South Phase 1 project by extending Wentzville Parkway South to Interstate Drive.
- The proposed cross-section will include a two-lane cross-section with curb and gutter and curb inlets along the east side of the roadway and an improved shoulder on the west side that will drain to an open ditch system. The cross-section will allow for future expansion to a five-lane cross-section when traffic demands call for it.
- The proposed project also proposes to build a six-foot sidewalk along the east side of the roadway that will connect to the recently constructed Interstate Drive Trail.

West Pearce Boulevard/Linn Avenue Signalization Project

- This project involves improving the intersection at West Pearce Boulevard and North Linn Avenue from an all-way stop to a signal control intersection.
- The project also includes pedestrian connectivity improvements, such as sidewalk replacements, curb ramps, crosswalks and ADA-compliant push buttons.

MoDOT Projects

Over the next several years, the Missouri Department of Transportation (MoDOT) will be undertaking major infrastructure improvements alongside these key City of Wentzville projects above. This includes the Improve I-70 project, which aims to enhance mobility and safety along the corridor. To learn more about this project, visit www.modot.org/ImproveI70. The City is actively collaborating with MoDOT to identify additional opportunities for improvement, such as a potential pedestrian bridge over Interstate 70 at South Linn Avenue and the possible extension of Mar-Le Drive to Pearce Boulevard under the railroad tracks. These efforts aim to enhance connectivity and accessibility for residents while aligning with ongoing regional transportation upgrades.

TREE-LIMB PICKUP

Twice yearly, the City's Chipper Program provides residents with a free, convenient way to dispose of small tree branches and limbs. This program is only for single-family residences. This program is NOT available for removing tree limbs or tree trunks larger than six inches in diameter. The Spring Chipper Program will take place over a three-week period — by Ward. If you're not sure which you live in, please visit www.wentzvillemo.gov/WardMap.

The spring 2025 collection of tree limbs is as follows:

- Ward 1: Week of April 7
- Ward 2: Week of April 14
- Ward 3: Week of April 21

Please note: this complimentary service is managed in-house. Since sign-ups for this service are not required, and crews do not have precise estimates for limb collection, extending pickup dates may be necessary. We value your patience and encourage you to stay tuned to the City's website and social media channels for any collection changes.

The City of Wentzville's Street Division performs the City Chipper Program. This tree branch or limb chipper program is NOT part of your solid waste collection performed by Meridian Waste. Tree limbs and branches for the Chipper Program must be stacked at the curb by 6 a.m. on the Monday of your Ward's scheduled Chipper Program week. Tree limbs must be less than six inches in diameter and should not be bundled or placed in bags. Bagged or tie-bundled materials will not be picked up. Root balls, bags or piles of leaves, decorative grasses, wood chips, bush or shrub trimmings, vines, or grass clippings are not included in this collection. UTILITY TAX REBATES

From April 1 through May 31, eligible residents can apply for a City utility-tax refund. Eligible residents should use one of these methods to apply for the rebate:

- **Email:** Send the required documentation to ContactUs@wentzvillemo.gov or submit an online application (beginning April 1).
- **Mail:** Send the required documentation to:
 - Utility Tax Rebate, City of Wentzville, 1001 Schroeder Creek Blvd., Wentzville, MO 63385
- **In-Person:** Schedule an appointment to apply at City Hall by calling (636) 639-2121 or making an appointment online.
- **Online:** Beginning April 1, you can apply online at www.wentzvillemo.gov/TaxRebate.

Resident Eligibility Criteria:

- You must rent or own your primary residence in the City of Wentzville.
- You must be at least 65 years old or considered totally disabled by Social Security,
- You must have a maximum 2024 gross income of \$57,800 for a single-person household or \$66,050 for a married-couple household. The refund program is based on your total gross income for the filing year 2024. Social security income is included in the calculation of gross income. These income requirements are set by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and can fluctuate each year.

The refund amount is a portion of the "City Tax" or "Franchise Tax" listed on your home or cell phone, electric and gas bills for 2024. If you haven't saved your bill stubs, you can contact your local utilities to request a report (please note: Brightspeed does not provide this report).

- Ameren: Request the "Municipal Tax Report" for 2024 by calling (314) 342-1111.
- Spire: Request the "Municipal Tax Report" for 2024 by calling (314) 621-6960.
- Cuivre River: Request the "Wentzville City Tax Report" for 2024 by calling (800) 392-3709.
- Contact your home or cell phone provider for this report.

When applying for the refund, residents will need the following:

- Photo ID
- Proof of Income (2024 1040 Federal Income Tax Form; if a resident does not file taxes, an SSA-1099 form can be submitted as proof of income)
- Proof of Disability, if applicable (SSA-1099/SSA 1042S form)
- Copies of 2024 home or cell phone, gas and electric bills or a Municipal Tax Report for each utility (see above)

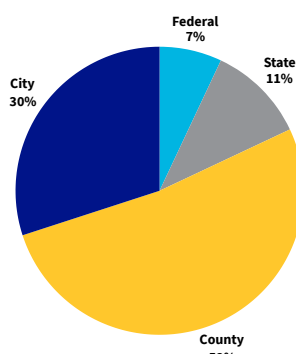
Board Update: Maximizing Transportation Funds

The City has allocated approximately \$45 million in its 2025 Capital Improvement Plan (or CIP) for transportation enhancements, ranging from sidewalk expansions to major highway reconstruction. These improvements are essential to maintaining and expanding Wentzville's infrastructure to meet the demands of a growing city. Ensuring a well-connected and dependable transportation system remains a top priority. The City does not fund these projects alone — as shown in the pie chart, more than half of this year's transportation improvements will receive financial support from county, state and federal sources. These strategic partnerships allow Wentzville to maximize local tax dollars, complete necessary upgrades and prevent delays in critical infrastructure improvements.

With continued development and increasing traffic demands, enhancing mobility and safety for residents and businesses is vital. The Board of Aldermen remains committed to forward-thinking planning and responsible stewardship to keep Wentzville thriving. These transportation projects align with the Board's Critical Success Factors.

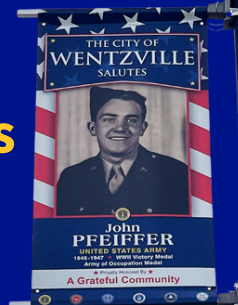

Salute Our Troops Banner Program



In every corner of our City, there are stories of valor, dedication and resilience waiting to be celebrated. Last year, Wentzville launched a banner program to honor and pay tribute to those brave individuals who selflessly serve or have served in the U.S. Armed Forces. Banners will be displayed on light poles in select areas of Wentzville between Memorial Day and Veterans Day and serve as a visual reminder of our gratitude and respect for those who have sacrificed to keep us safe and secure. Honorees must currently reside or have an immediate family member who resides in Wentzville and also be one of the following:

- Presently serving full-time active duty in the U.S. Armed Forces
- A retired military veteran
- An honorably discharged veteran
- A member of the U.S. Armed Forces who died while on active duty

Submission of the application requires a completed application, proof of City of Wentzville residency, military verification (DD214 for Veterans or Military ID for Active Duty), a high-quality 5x7 inch photo of the serviceperson in uniform in JPG format, and a \$150 payment to the City of Wentzville.

Submission of application does not guarantee acceptance or reservation. Applications are selected on a first-come, first-served basis. Applications may be submitted online at www.wentzvillemo.gov/SaluteOurTroops.
