

Protect Our Pets

As temperatures continue to rise, it's important to remember that the heat affects our pets the same way it affects us. Protect your furry friends from the heat by following these important guidelines for summer pet care.

- Never leave your pet in a parked car.
- Always have a bowl of water out for your pet.
- Limit exercise on especially hot days.
- Keep an eye on the humidity level.
- Watch for signs of heat stroke.
- Don't rely on a fan to cool off your pet.
- When in doubt, bring your pet indoors to rest in a cool, shaded space.

Split Irrigation Continues Until Sept. 30

To help maintain a sustainable water supply during the summer, residents and businesses are encouraged to follow a split watering schedule from June 1 to Sept. 30. This includes a suggested three-day-per-week plan based on address numbers, plus tips for watering outside peak hours to improve efficiency and water pressure. Business Grants

Do you own (or are you planning to own) a business in Historic Downtown Wentzville? If so, consider applying for a Facade Improvement or Business Development grant during the Aug. 1-31 application period. The Board of Aldermen is committed to preserving and improving Historic Downtown Wentzville. These grants will help to stimulate property development, strengthen new and existing businesses, and facilitate the rehabilitation of downtown buildings — all while preserving their history and community value. Protect Yourself Outdoors

An increase in outdoor activities during the summer and fall also increases the risk for insect bites and exposure to diseases that mosquitoes and ticks may carry. To minimize illnesses from insect bites, use repellent when you are outdoors and check for bugs after you return home. An insect repellent containing DEET, picaridin, IR3535 or oil of lemon eucalyptus has been proven to provide protection when used according to the manufacturer's instructions. Products containing permethrin can be applied to clothing but should not have direct contact with skin. In addition, those outdoors should wear long-sleeved shirts/jackets, and long pants and should tuck pants into socks to minimize exposure.

When returning from the outdoors, check for ticks on your body and your pets, and remove them immediately (use tweezers to ensure you remove the entire creature). Watch for signs of illness such as rash or fever in the days and weeks following a tick bite, and see a health care provider if these develop. Your risk of acquiring a tick-borne illness depends on many factors, including where you live, what type of tick bit you and how long the tick was attached. If you become ill after a tick bite, see a health-care provider.

Preventing Mosquitos in Your Yard

- Drain areas where water settles.
- Clean birdbaths weekly.
- Store anything that can hold water or cover it.
- Clean clogged rain gutters.
- Repair dripping faucets.
- Change the water in outdoor pet bowls daily.
- Replace damaged window and door screens.
- Remove or fill in standing water areas in the yard.
- Don't dump grass clippings, branches, etc., in creeks.

Safe Exchange Zone

To support safer online transactions, WPD offers designated parking spaces at the Law Enforcement Center for meetups arranged through buy-sell-trade platforms. These spots, located at 1019 Schroeder Creek Blvd., provide a monitored location available 24/7.

Traffic Safety Starts at Home

Prevent Vehicle Break-Ins

While WPD provides around-the-clock patrols, residents can help prevent theft with a few key practices:

- Always lock your vehicle and remove valuables from view.
- Remove firearms from unattended vehicles or store them securely.
- Never leave keys or key fobs in your vehicle.

Golf Carts in Wentzville

The City reminds drivers to practice caution in residential areas, especially when operating a golf cart. In order to maintain driver, passenger and pedestrian safety, please remind yourself of the following golf cart ownership and operation requirements in the City of Wentzville. Please follow these guidelines and practice safety at all times when operating a golf cart on City streets.

- Golf carts may only be driven on City streets with a speed limit of 25 MPH or less, or when crossing streets with a speed limit of 35 MPH or less.
- Golf-cart drivers must be at least 16 years old and must possess a valid driver's license.
- Golf carts must be equipped with a parking brake, a rearview mirror, a VIN number and seat belts for rear-facing seats.

Additionally, per the ordinance, golf carts are exempt from the requirement of titling and registration under Sections 307.350 to 307.402, RSMo, if they meet specific National Highway Traffic Safety Administration standards for low-speed vehicles. Operators must also maintain insurance on their golf carts, as required by Chapter 303, RSMo. The ordinance also clarifies that:

- Golf carts must not be operated on sidewalks, multi-use trails, paths or walkways unless designated as a golf cart lane.
- Golf carts cannot be driven at speeds exceeding 20 MPH.
- Golf carts must be equipped with lights and reflectors when operated during hours of darkness, including a front-facing headlamp and a rear-facing red lamp.
