To Our Community:

The Wentzville Police Department is committed to our residents and the visitors who come to our city. We continue to monitor our survey tool that allows citizens who come into contact with Wentzville Police Department staff to provide feedback on their experience looking for any way to improve. We continue our community outreach programs such as Citizen Police Academy, Teen Police Academy, Welcome to Wentzville program and National Night Out. We have other programs such as Cops and Bobbers, Coffee with a Cop and Trunk or Treat events. We are constantly scanning, looking for opportunities to engage with our community in our efforts to “humanize the badge.”

The Wentzville Police Department recognizes the importance of regional partnerships. We still participate in joint agency programs to provide more effective and diverse services to this City such as the St. Charles County Regional Drug Task Force and St. Charles County Regional S.W.A.T. We continue to participate in the St. Charles County Regional Critical Incident Response Team which is a regional approach to critical incidents, such as officer involved shootings. Having a regional team look at a situation such as that provides for transparency and accountability and instills public confidence in our police department. Additionally, the Wentzville Police Department is still involved in the St. Charles County Regional Crime Interdiction Task Force. This is a regional proactive effort where each agency in the County assigns officers to a team that is charged with looking for and addressing criminal activity. This team has been very successful in addressing these types of issues. Most recently, Wentzville PD has partnered with other agencies in the area and the Highway Patrol to conduct regional traffic enforcement on the major highways in the region. The Wentzville Police Department supports and participates in the St. Louis County Major Case Squad. This unit provides a means to assist ourselves and our neighboring communities in solving acts of heinous or high-profile crimes occurring in that community. We provide investigators and report writers for the Squad.

The Wentzville Police Department continues to look for technologies that help us provide services to the community. We have developed a Special Operations Bureau that works on researching and implementing new technologies that are, what we in the business term, force multipliers. Examples of this are the implementation of FLOCK cameras in and around the city. These allow us to track criminal activity as it comes into and out of our city. We have implemented an in-car camera system that works with our body worn cameras giving us the best opportunity to capture incidents that we are involved in. Wentzville PD is using drones, both large and small, to enhance search capabilities and officer safety. Our smaller drones are capable of being used in buildings for suspects and evidence recovery.

Wentzville continues its partnership with the Missouri Police Chiefs Association to keep our accreditation up to date and current. In 2025, we went through the re-accreditation process which we successfully completed.

Wentzville went through the process to become a Blue Shield City. The Blue Shield City designation is an initiative out of the Governor's office that is based on the City's commitment to Law Enforcement and our efforts to combat violent crime. We have reapplied for this designation in 2026 and have once again received it.

While we, as an agency, are very good about looking out into the community and forward, trying to stay ahead of technological advances, we have discovered a gap in our internal communications. This failure has led to internal strife and dissatisfaction in some of our employees. Upon identifying this issue, we have worked to come up with several strategies to address the problem. We are in the process and development of communication tools to better engage with our employees. We are conducting surveys with our employees to learn the best methods of communication. Our employees are our highest priority. Without them we are unable to serve you, our community!

In 2023, the Wentzville Police Department went through a strategic planning process. Our mission statement says:

The Wentzville Police Department will serve the residents, businesses, and visitors of the City of Wentzville with integrity, courage, and commitment. We will:

- Prevent, reduce, and deter crime and the fear of crime.
- Provide the best officers through critical hiring practices and exceptional and relevant training.
- Protect and safeguard individual rights by expecting officers to exercise discretion, emotional intelligence, and empathy when interacting with the public.
- Promote modern policing techniques with innovative technology.

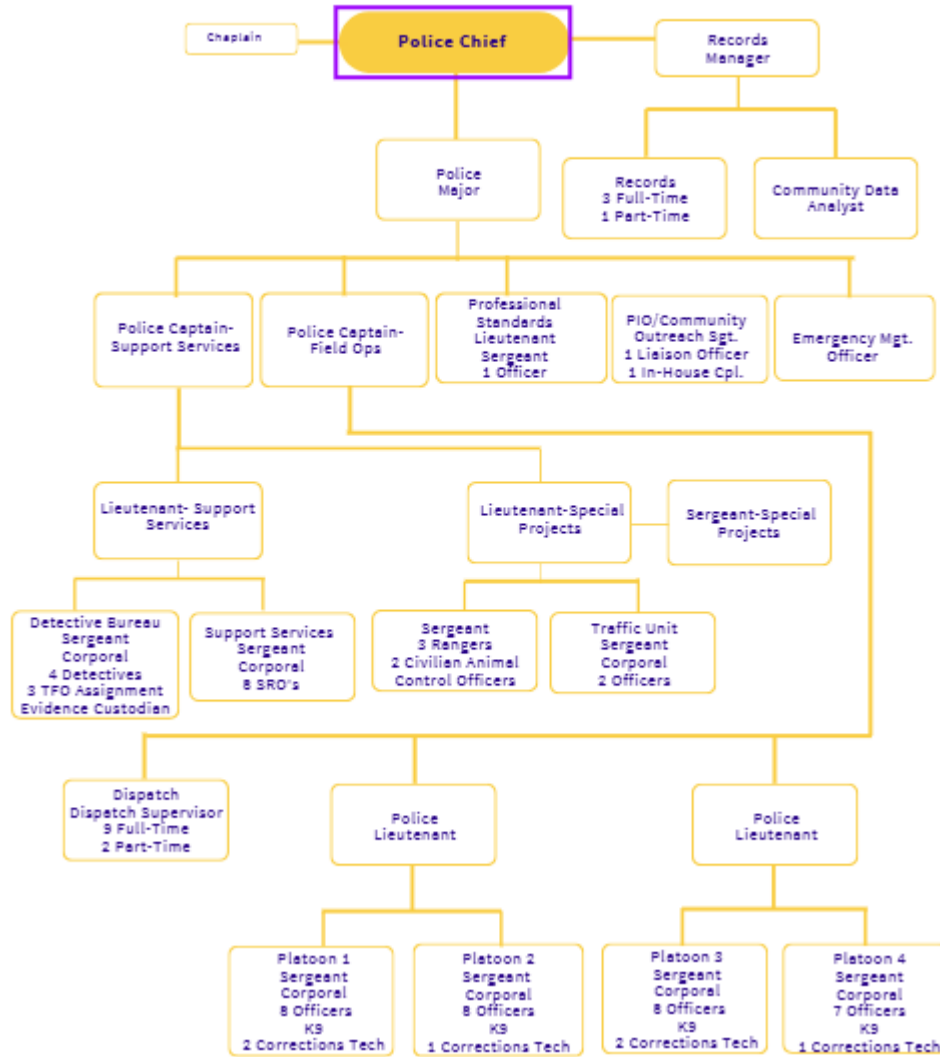

Divisions:

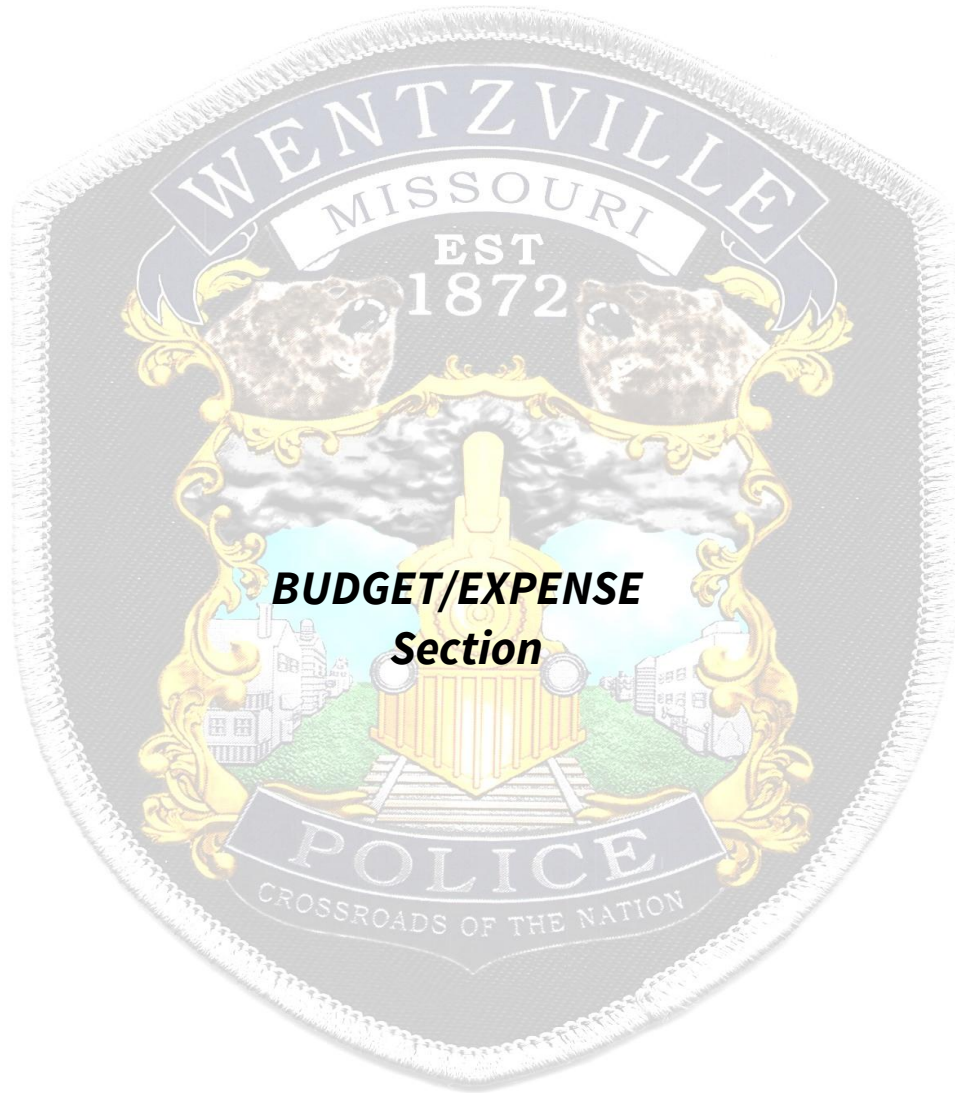
The Wentzville Police Department is comprised of 87 commissioned law enforcement officers along with 23 full-time and multiple part-time support staff employees. Chief Paul West leads the agency which is comprised of two divisions: Field Operations and Support Services Divisions. Major Leon Burton is the Assistant Chief of Police and manages the Captain of Support Services, the Captain of Field Operations, the Professional Standards Unit and the Emergency Management Specialist. Captain Kevin Pyatt commands the Support Services Division and Captain Emmanuel Borroum commands the Field Operations Division.

The Field Operations Division is comprised of all the Patrol Platoons, the Communications Center, the Corrections Division, and the K9 Unit. Patrol Officers are the backbone of the department and serve the community at large by responding to a variety of calls for service while combining a proactive approach to crime prevention by actively patrolling the neighborhoods and business areas.

The Support Services Division consists of all supporting functions of the police department. Encompassed in this Division are the Detective Bureau, School Resource Officers, Traffic Unit, Animal Control Officers, Park Rangers and Records Division.

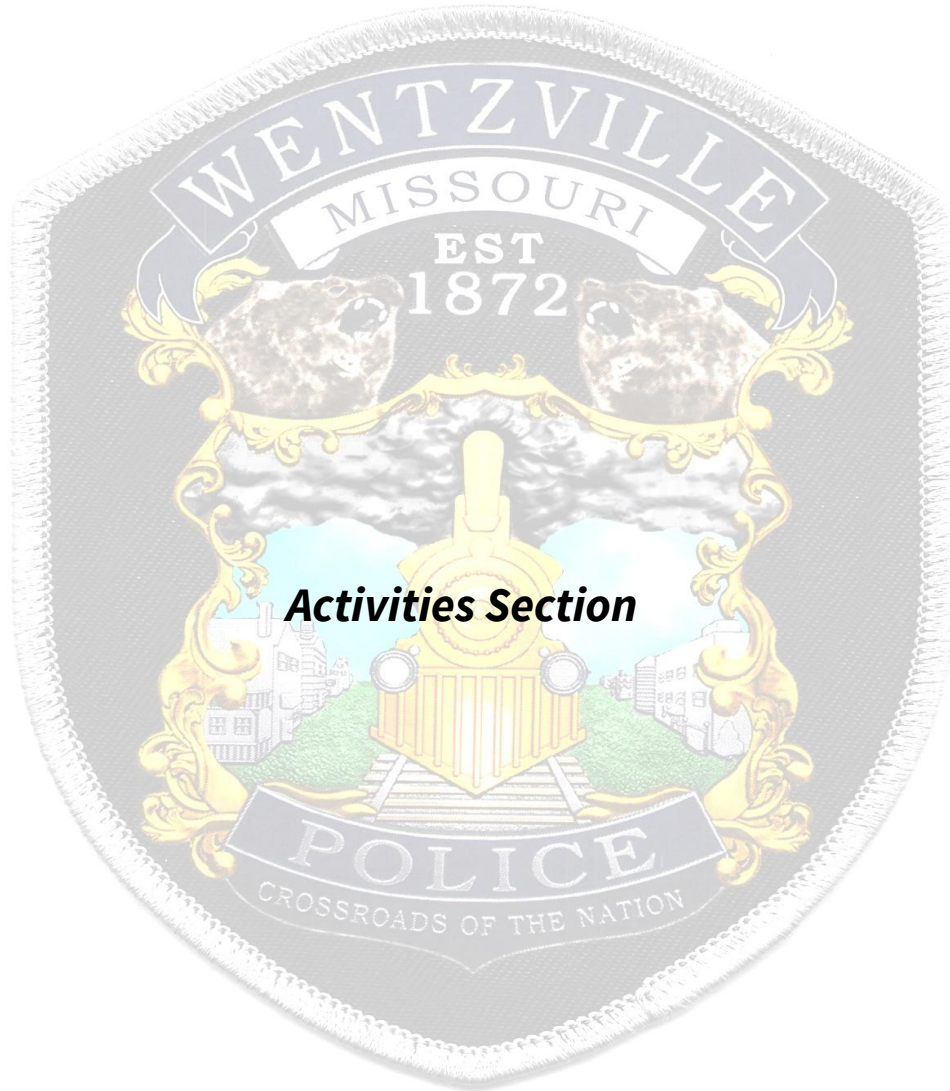

National Incident Based Reporting (NIBRS)

The Records Department has been submitting statistical data to the FBI and the State of Missouri through NIBRS since 2017.

NIBRS allows for an agency to submit up to 10 offenses that occurred with one incident, rather than just the main offense that the UCR summary-based program allowed. An example would be if there were an assault and a theft that occurred, with UCR, we would only report the assault; with NIBRS we will report both the assault and the theft.

In NIBRS, there are Group A and Group B offenses. There are 52 Group A offenses that we report. With the Group A offenses, NIBRS counts the offenses, as well as the arrests for those crimes. There are 10 Group B offenses. For these type offenses, NIBRS will only count the arrest.

UCR and NIBRS both have Crimes against Property and Crimes against Persons. However, with NIBRS, they have added a third category of Crimes against Society. Crimes against Society are typically victimless crimes, such as curfew violations, disorderly conduct, runaways, or trespassing.

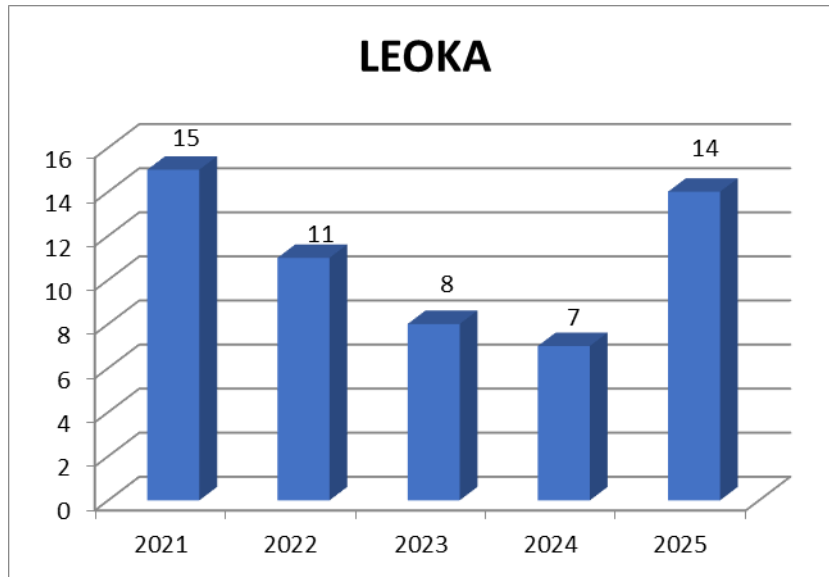

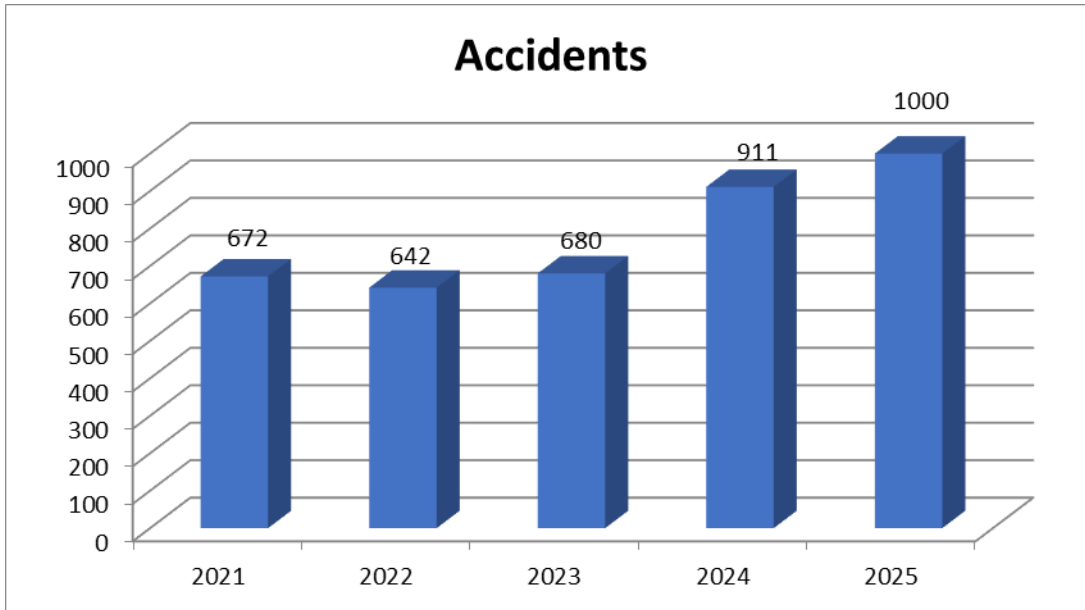

Law Enforcement Officers Killed or Assaulted (LEOKA):



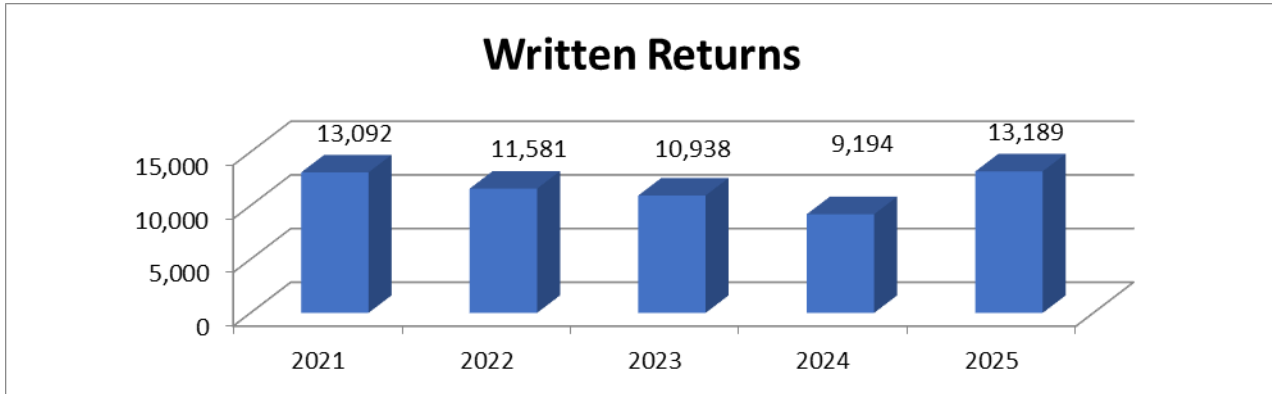
Traffic Accident Report:

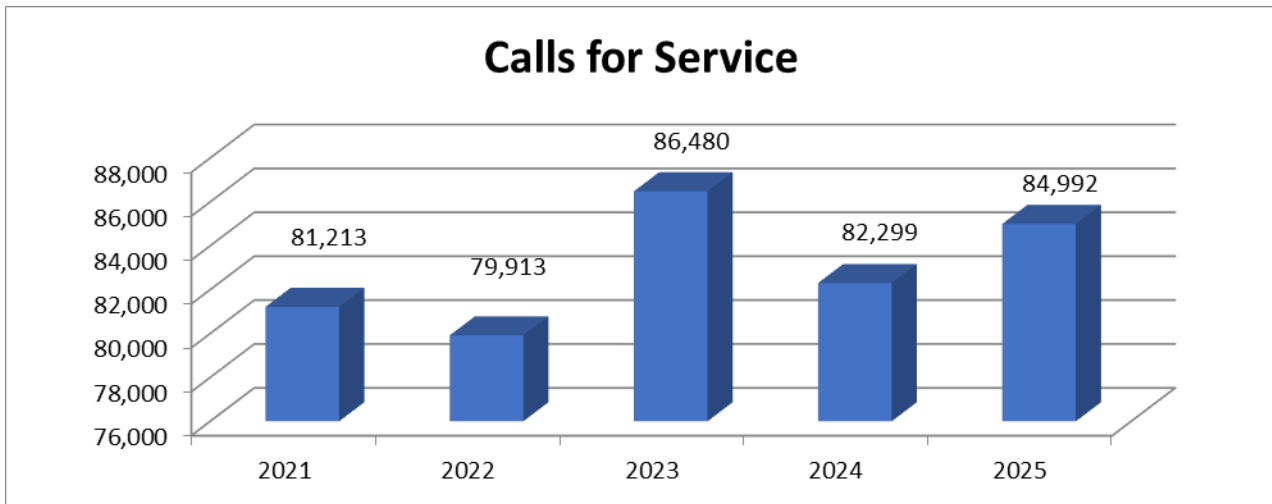
Citations/Warnings Report:

Communications/Records Activity:

The Communications and the Records Divisions handle multiple types of situations. Dispatch communicates with the officers via radio and telephone. They enter calls in the computer system to track who is responding and the information that is relayed. They run subjects through the MULES system for the officers to see vehicle registration, driver’s license status, and criminal history. They answer the 911 calls, as well as non-emergency calls.

The Records Division answers incoming calls to the department and routes them to the appropriate division, works with the public and other agencies in obtaining copies of reports and statistics. They enter data into the records management system for NIBRS reporting and quality control of reports. They work with records retention and destruction, as well as review traffic accident reports for electronic submission to the state, among a host of other responsibilities.

These divisions are an integral part of the team and are vital in keeping the Department running smoothly. Below is a list of some of the activities they do:

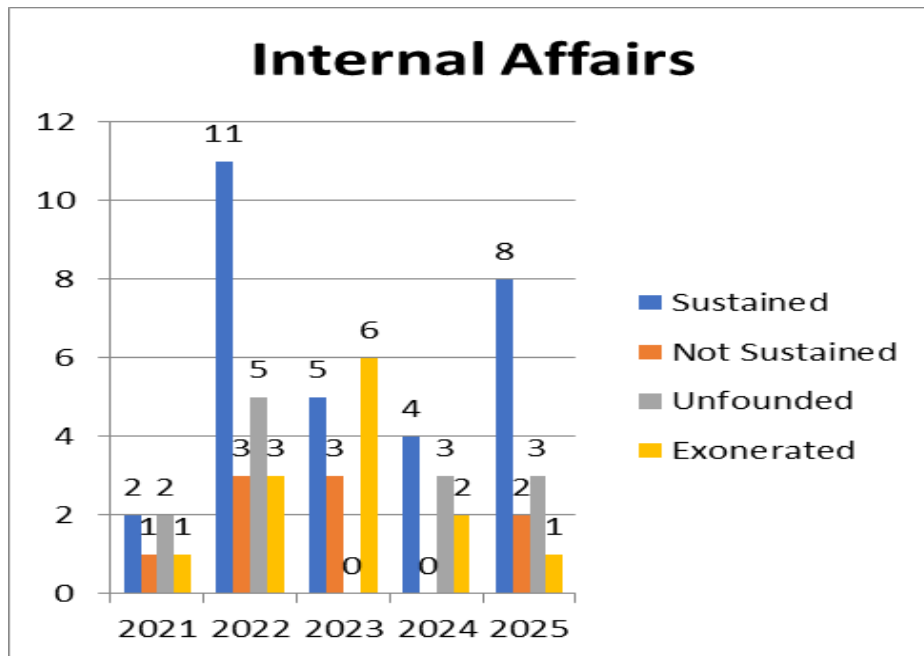

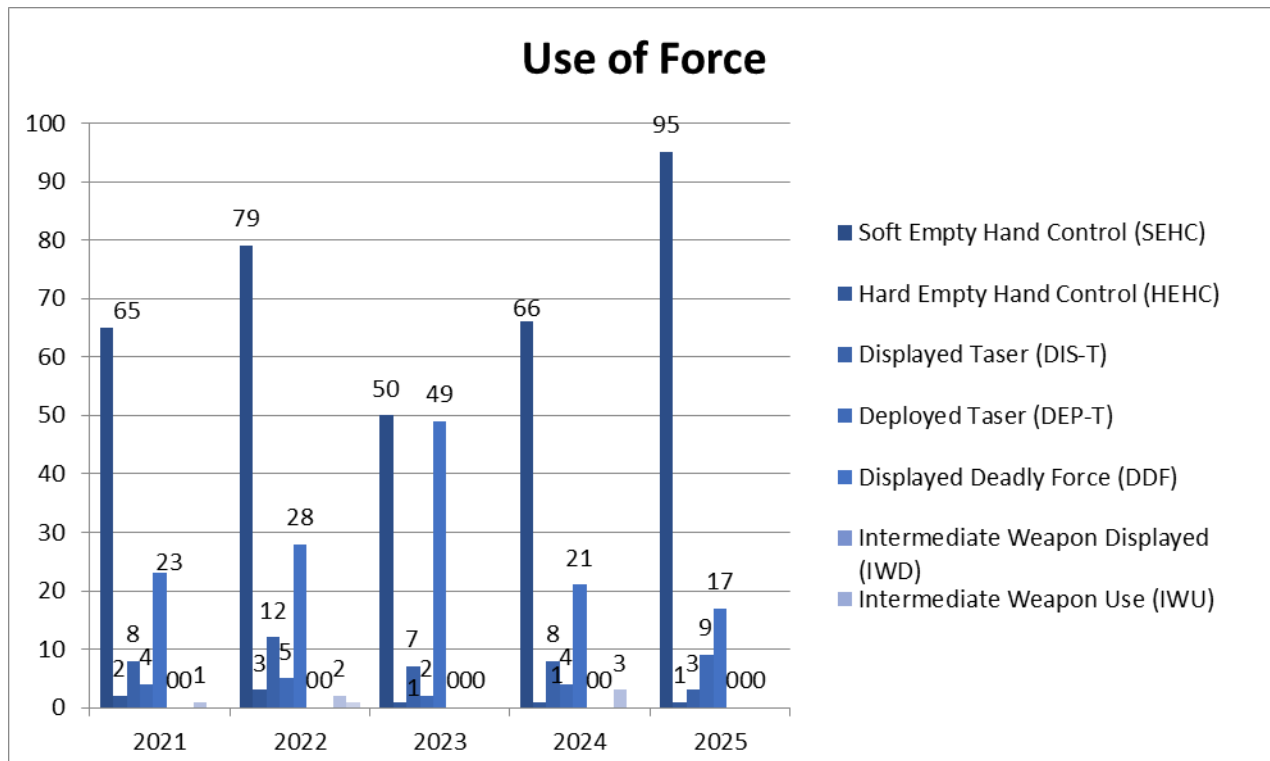

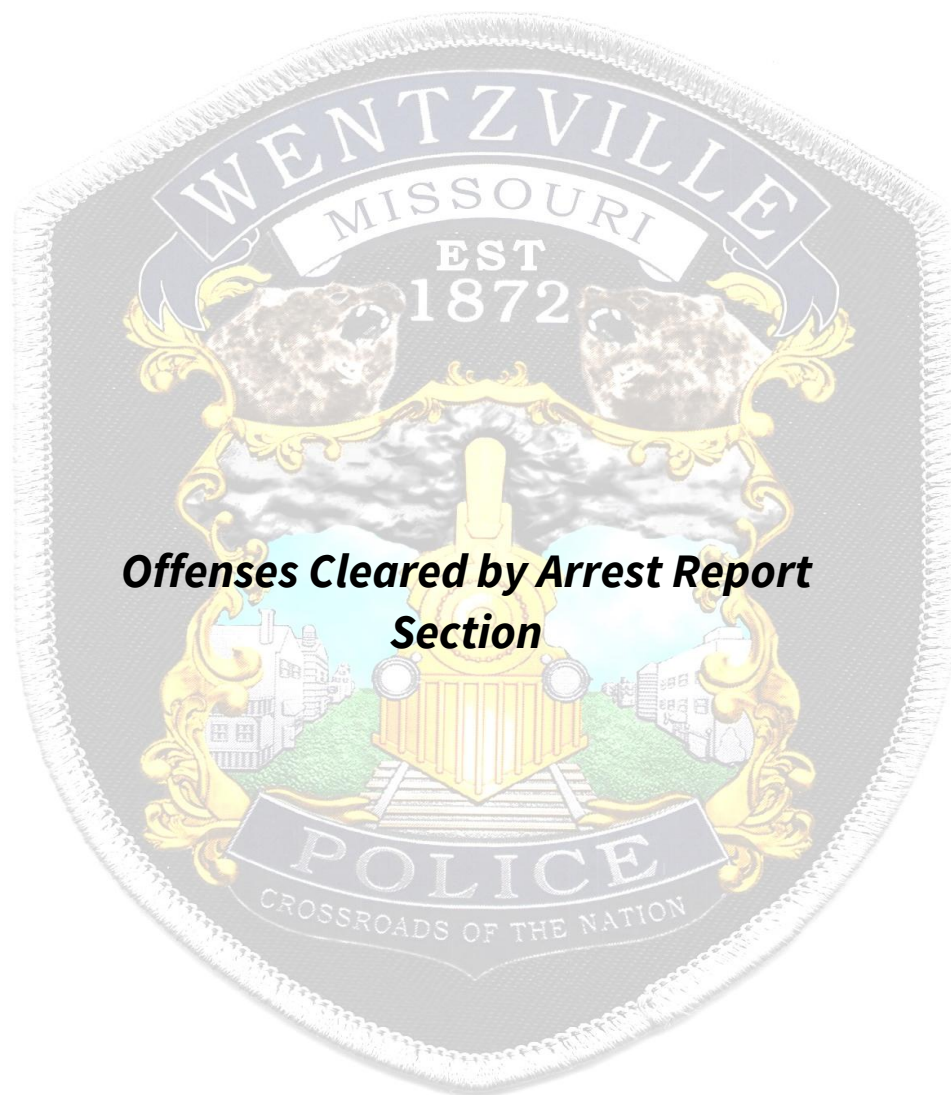
Use of Force

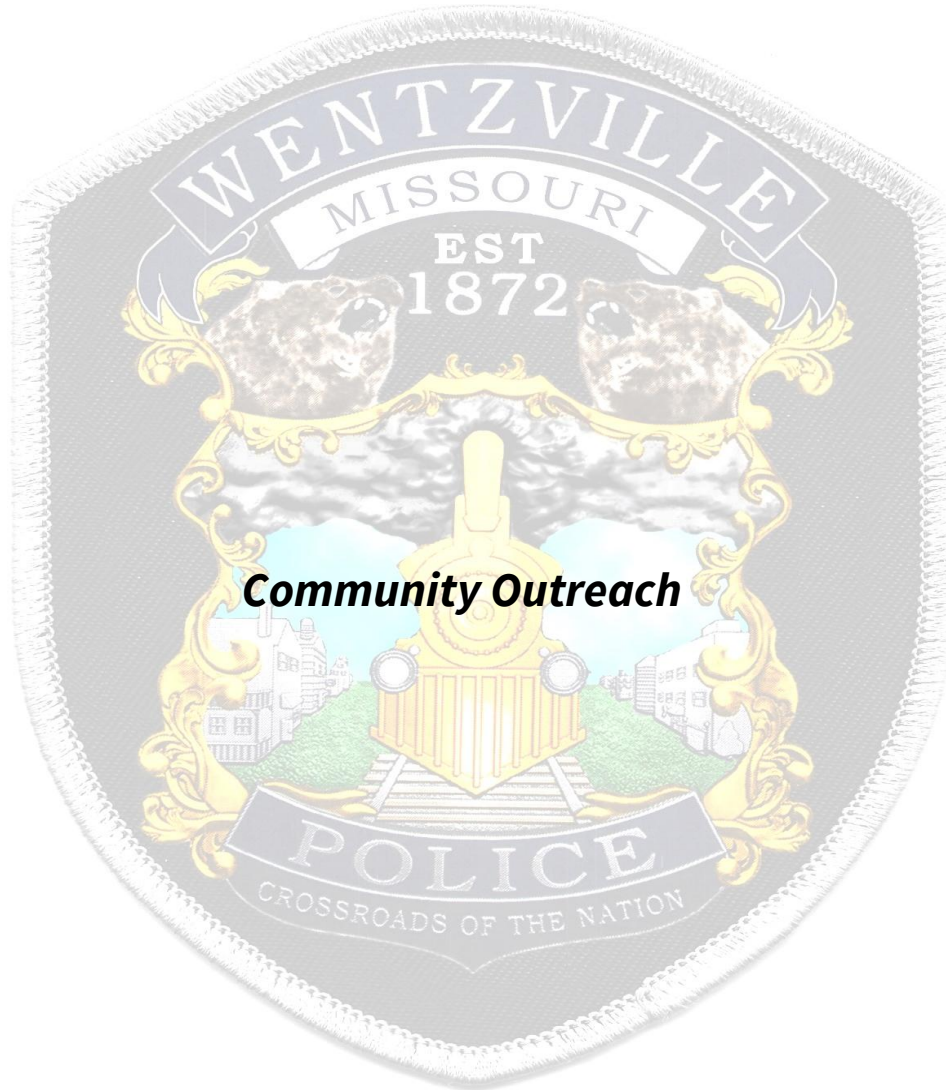
